PASTOR'S PEN

Dear Friends and Church Family,

I have been thinking this morning about how we tend to navigate through life. At one time the standard for most travel was the sun by day and the stars by night. Later somebody discovered the magnetic north pole and came up with the idea of a compass. At some point in time explorers began making maps. Actually these were probably drawn even back in the days of "sun and stars," but not to Rand McNally quality. And in the last decade, at least for personal use, we have had the benefit of GPS and satellite technology to help us find our way. Even young school age kids know what the Garmin or TomTom on the dashboard is for. That's right, it is the thing that keeps mom from suggesting that dad stop to get directions! I am somewhat addicted to maps and hardcopy myself; something I learned from my dad. With a few minutes of work I normally have the picture fixed in my mind where I am headed. These wonderful tools have kept me from being lost, as well as some bad parts of town.

All these things, however, haven't completely solved the questions of where we are going and how we're going to get there. Many people have traveled through life at breakneck speed only to discover that their "maps" have led them to a destination they didn't expect. They were told that if they just take this path or that path that they would end up "happy and fulfilled". Result: Dead End! Others didn't trust the compass, maps, or GPS, opting instead to take their own road. In the end, they were empty on the inside and totally clueless as to where they were.

The best map I have ever read was they

one that was marked well with warning signs. One of them said, *there is a way that seems right to a man, but in the end it leads to death*. For years I tried to navigate through life in a way that seemed right to me...and I was dying. But the map with all the warnings offered a son rather than the stars to guide me. Ultimately, this map has enabled me to negotiate every lousy road and obstacle in life. I've discovered that even the roads that were not desired have enabled me to become a better driver as I have steered toward my destination. The destination is a place I've never been before, but that's what makes this trip exciting.

When I was a boy my family only took a few vacation trips, but I think the classic question was "When are we going to be there?" As I grow older I've learned that the answer is probably "All too soon!" So instead of wondering "When?" I've decided to enjoy the sights along the way. There are too many things we miss if the only thing on our mind is arriving. Besides, what we do (or fail to do) along the way will be the subject of a very important conversation with the Son and His Father when we arrive.

While you are traveling this summer along the journey to the Father's House be sure to follow the directions he has given us. You'll find them in the big map book called the Bible. John 14:1-6 will help you know the right road to take. When in doubt, follow the Son.
